Plants can be consumed in teas, used as garnish, applied topically as essential oil or consumed as a pill. It's important to remember that you should always double check with your doctor before consuming or using anything new for your body. If you choose to grow some of these plants, remember to take proper care according to the plant's care guidelines and refrain from using any pesticides or other harmful chemicals on your plants.
